

USING CLIPPING PATHS IN INDESIGN




- Open an existing project
- Place your image by going toFile > Place
- Or Navigate to where it is saved, select it once, press
 Open and click within the document to place






After placing the image it should still be selected, if not use the Selection Tool to select by clicking once on the graphic


Go to Object > Clipping Path > Options






- Within the Clipping Path floating panel use the drop down menu and select Path type
- Then select OK
- This separates the image from the dark background


- The path should be selected and highlighted in brown/orange
- Also the Direct Selection Tool should be active.
- With this tool you can adjust the path.
- Simply click on one of the points to adjust





- As the path is now an InDesign path you can add and delete points using the Pen Tool
- Ensure that the path is highlighted by using the Direct Selection Tool, pick the Add Anchor Point Tool and click anywhere on the path to add a point
- Similarly you can use the Delete
 Anchor Point Tool to remove points
 by clicking on them

- The Path is complete, you can convert the Clipping Path to a frame.
- Select the current frame with the Selection Tool and go to Object > Clipping Path
 > Convert Clipping Path to Frame.
